### "A LIGHT FOR REVELATION TO THE GENTILES, AND GLORY FOR YOUR PEOPLE ISRAEL."

e begin this month with an excerpt from the Canticle of Simeon which is part of the Gospel for the Solemnity of the Presentation, February 2nd.

Simeon was an old man at the very end of his life by the time Jesus was presented in the Temple. This Canticle is a poignant reminder, prayed each night at Compline (Night Prayer) of our journey toward the end of our day and our lives. Simeon's prayer calls to mind the light he and we have seen and experienced in Jesus. Having experienced Him and His revelation we can rest peacefully and in peace.

Simeon had waited all his life for this moment in which he meets Jesus, the Messiah. As noted in scripture, Simeon had listened to the voice of the Holy Spirit and trusted in the Spirit's direction even though it seemed to have taken forever to come to fruition.

Last month we concluded our leadership reflection by considering our 'why' and how that why, if we rightly listen to the Holy Spirit, is at

the core of our Christian life and the leadership we are called to exercise.


For both Simeon and the Prophetess Anna, their length of days is a testament to their faith and trust. Listening to God's direction was their why, was the center of their lives. They lived with total dedication. Those attributes make them leaders from their why, examples for us in living our why.

As leaders there are two ways by which others see our why and find inspiration for their why. Those are what we demonstrate and what we tolerate or do not tolerate.

Simeon and Anna demonstrate their why by their complete faithfulness and proclamation of what God has revealed to them. Their why does not allow them to tolerate departure from that faithfulness. Their why helps them to see beyond their struggles and the wait.

Focused on leadership let us take account of what we demonstrate and tolerate. As we take or withhold actions, let us ensure we are consistent in living our why.

# THE PRE-LENTEN SEASON



The pre-Lenten season begins late this year, starting on Sunday, February 16th. The Pre-Lenten Season of Septuagesima is a period of preparation before the beginning of the liturgical season of Lent. Septuagesima includes three Sundays: Septuagesima Sunday (70 days to Passion Sunday), Sexagesima Sunday (60 days to Passion Sunday), and Quinquagesima Sunday (50 days to Passion Sunday). We are called to make a special point of selfexamination, of considering the things we need to repent of so we may enter our Lenten discipline on Ash Wednesday fully prepared and head on.

We encourage all parishioners to take part in at least one of our additional weekly devotions and so deepen their connection with our

Lord and Savior in prayer this Lent. These devotions begin Friday, March 7th.

Stations of the Cross will be held each Friday in Lent at 3pm. Bitter Lamentations / Gorzkie Żale will be held each Sunday at 3pm.

#### Lenten Disciplines

There are various Lenten Disciplines we are called to engage in.

The first is fasting. As used in the context of our Church, fasting

means abstinence from meats. We are called to fast on Wednesdays and Fridays throughout Lent.

The other discipline of Lent, beside additional prayer as noted above in our article on Lenten Devotions, is charity. We encourage all to make a sacrifice of food items by donating such for those in need in our local community.

The following are suggestions for each week of Lent:

1st Week, FEELING FRUITY: Canned Peaches, Pears, Fruit Cocktail, Pineapple or Applesauce, 100% Juice in Cans.

2nd Week, VEGGIE MANIA: Canned Corn, Canned Peas, Canned Beans, Canned Potatoes, Canned Sweet Potatoes.

3rd Week, DINNER IS SERVED: Canned Beef Stew, Canned Pork and Beans, Instant Potatoes/Stuffing Mix, Macaroni and Cheese, Spaghetti or other Pasta, Canned Spaghetti Sauce.

4th Week of Lent, SCHOOL NEEDS: Pencils and Pens, Folders and Notebooks, Crayons, Tape and Elmer's Glue.

Passion Week, BABY MAKES THREE: Disposable Diapers, Baby Wipes, Liquid Formula, Jars of Baby Food.

Holy Week, SPECIAL NEEDS DIET: Low Sodium Soups, Canned Fruit in Juice (not in syrup), Canned Tuna in Water, Low Sodium Crackers, Organic Applesauce.

#### **Your WHY**

To find your why, reflect on when you felt most alive, what drives you, and the impact you want to have. Think about peak moments when you felt fulfilled. Consider your talents and passions. Ponder the legacy you want to leave.

#### The Sacrament of Penance in the Polish National Catholic Church

"When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained'." (John 20:19-23)

At the Fourth General Synod of the PNCC held in 1921, Bishop Hodur taught that: "Public confession, general or particular, has in the Polish National Catholic Church, the same significance as private or auricular confession. It is one of the necessary conditions of penance, that holy act ordained by Jesus Christ for the rebirth of a person and the uniting of him to God."

While he had started the practice of public general confession at St. Stanislaus Parish in Scranton at

an earlier time, it was only at this Synod that it was established as sacramental teaching and practice for the whole Church, when the delegates accepted it unanimously. Bishop Hodur provided a theological rationale for this when giving a lecture on the sacrament of Penance around that same time, stating that:

"Christ established the Sacrament of Penance, as he established the Sacraments of the Word of God, Communion, Baptism or Order, but He did not leave specific regulations as to how this saving, penitential method is to be applied. The creation of forms He left to the Church...Christ the Lord did not like to keep to the letter or the form but to the principle and the spirit... We, therefore, the spiritual and historical heirs of this religious trust, whose foundation is the Apostles and cornerstone Jesus Christ, retain these ancient forms of penance: public confession, general and individual, and private or auricular, appropriate to the discretion and needs of the penitent and confessors".

Auricular confession is recommended for the young and all who need the private advice of the priest."


